Space Tour Offered by Friends of the Library

The sky's the limit on Tuesday, May 10, when magnificent views from the Hubble Space Telescope are presented at the Northville District Library. Jesse Mason, Oakland Community College physics and astronomy lab tech, will present "Hubble's Hot 100", the best of the deep sky images from HST's 25-year tenure in orbit. Weather permitting, Mason also will invite audience members to take a telescope-aided celestial tour.

The 12-ton, billion-dollar Hubble telescope, the size of a school bus, was named for astronomer Edwin Hubble. It was built by NASA with contributions by the European Space Agency. It was launched into low-earth orbit in 1990, streaks through space at 16,000 miles per hour and is expected to remain operational for another 10 years.

WHO ARE THE FRIENDS?

<u>Early beginnings</u>. The earliest information was gleaned from the minutes of the Northville Public Library Advisory Commission as no other specific information has been found. The first library supporters evolved out of this commission.

The earliest documentation of fund raising to support the library was June 24, 1969. A used book sale was held at a Flea Market at Our Lady of Victory Church in Northville. Another used book sale was held at the Northville Sidewalk Sales that summer. Total proceeds from those sales were \$189.75. With those funds, a 24" globe was purchase for the library. Used book sales continued and by the end of 1971 over \$800.00 had been raised. During that time furniture and portable bookshelves were purchased for the library.

The first mention of the "Friends" was at the annual meeting of the Library Commission on December 3, 1970, but it wasn't until February 15, 1973 that the Commission publically introduced the library auxiliary to be called "Friends of the Library". In October 1989, the Friends became a legally incorporated organization with the State of Michigan.

<u>Today</u>. From that handful of people, we have grown to almost 300 Friends members. Other Friends-sponsored fund raising activities include the: Gift Store, Gift Book Program and Membership. The Used Book Sales (semi-annual sales, the Cellar, and the cart sales) continue to be the largest fundraisers. Each year the library gives us a "Wish List" of things they need or would like to have to enhance the patron's library experience. To date we have not declined any request and since 1969 through 2014 we have donated \$601,368.10! <u>We've come a long way</u>! It is only through the hard work of the Friend's Board of Directors and all our volunteers that we have been able to provide this support. Thank you for 'Being a Friend'.







Library Friends Focus on the Edmund Fitzgerald

It was a stormy night 40 years ago Nov. 10 that the Edmund Fitzgerald sank in the stormy waters of Lake Superior. That night will be revisited on **Tuesday, Nov. 10**, in the Northville District Library when photographer Lori Feret details that sinking in Power Point.



The Edmund Fitzgerald was a huge freighter, 729 feet in length. Known as the "Queen of the Great Lakes", it reigned for 13 years as the largest ship on the Great Lakes. It was bound for Cleveland loaded with 26,000 tons of iron ore. But it proved no match that night to 30-foot waves and winds gusting to 96 miles per hour off White Fish Point. The ship went down with its crew of 29. That sinking was later to be put to song by Gordon Lightfoot.
