NDL'S BATTLE OF THE BOOKS TEAM

Imagine a very large room full of middle schoolers yelling and cheering about books. Sound loud and bothersome? Not to these three librarians. Suzanne Schimanski-Gross, Teen Services librarian; Laura Curtsinger, Youth Services librarian, and Julie Ramsden, Youth/Teen Services librarian, enthusiastically coordinate the annual middle school Battle of the

Books competition, and they all agree... the louder, the better. That means more teens have come up with the correct answer, which means more kids have read the books, one of the program's goals.

"The friendly competition and teamwork provide an unusual and fun interaction with books that brings together avid, average, and reluctant readers. They challenge themselves and gain something valuable from the experience," said Suzanne. She has been a librarian for 20 years, 11 at

NDL. "We are headed into our tenth year, and every year we have around 150 students competing. Parents and students tell us what they love, and it ranges from the books, the teamwork, the costumes, to the competition itself."

"We start in July, reading numerous books in order to choose just the right 7 titles, " said Julie, who has been a librarian for 18 years, the past 7 at NDL. "I don't think people realize how difficult it is to choose books from different genres, with different reading levels, varied lengths, with male and female protagonists, and with nothing offensive or controversial in the

content. It is not easy!"

Laura, a librarian for 19 years, the past 18 at NDL, enjoys the energy of the participants on Battle night. "I love writing the questions for the competition," said Laura. "I am also one of the judges and I enjoy seeing their answers and in some cases, drawings (!) on the answer cards. A lot of work goes into Battle behind the scenes to ensure we conduct a fair, well-run Battle.

> We rely on a lot of volunteers and staff members to make it happen."

Battle of the Books is just one of the responsibilities for these librarians, all of whom also plan and host Tween and/ or Teen events, assist with summer reading programs, and have scheduled time daily on the public desks providing reference and reading assistance. Suzanne is responsible for all Teen programs and collections. She enjoys working with teens and helping them connect with just the right book.

Laura hosts Drop-In Storytimes and orders all youth fiction and some non-fiction. She enjoys ordering fiction the most, especially when she has already ordered that year's Newbery Award book well before it has been announced as an award-winner. Julie hosts Saturday Storytime for families, and conducts tours for scout groups, preschools and homeschooling groups. She enjoys coming up with new ideas for craft and after-hour events.

Busy as these librarians are on a daily basis, it is very likely they are also either reading, writing questions or thinking about plans for the next Battle of the Books.
