NDL ENDS OVERDUE FINES AND RELEASES ITS FY2023-2025 STRATEGIC PLAN

Dear Northville,

I have two exciting announcements to share with you regarding the forward momentum of NDL:

First, beginning Thursday, December 1, 2022, the Northville District Library will discontinue charging overdue fines for nearly the entire collection. All previously accrued overdue fines will also be waived.

Peer research has shown that moving to a fine-free model of service eliminates barriers to library usage, and encourages people to return library materials they previously kept in order to avoid paying fines. By taking this step, the NDL will become even more welcoming and convenient for all members of our community to use. If you had stopped visiting the NDL due to an accumulation of overdue fines, we welcome you back to the Library! If you have not used the NDL because you were worried about finishing materials by a certain deadline to avoid incurring fines, this is no longer an issue for you. Please visit us and explore the variety of beneficial resources the NDL offers. Ask a librarian to share with you the many online databases and downloadables accessible with your NDL card from wherever you are. Browse through the STEM kits, Wonder books, audiobooks, telescopes, and playaways available. You will be amazed by what you can borrow from your NDL.

If anyone happens to have books from NDL that they have not returned as a result of overdue fines, please feel encouraged to return them no matter

how old they are! There will be no penalty and all overdue charges will be removed from your account.

I do wish to clarify that while the NDL is ending the practice of issuing overdue fines, fees will continue to be charged for lost and damaged books so that replacements can be obtained. This ensures our collection continues to be robust and well-rounded for the eniovment of all.

Secondly, the Northville District Library has been working on a new strategic plan in the past year. This document will serve as a roadmap for how the Library provides service to the community for the next three years. The plan has been completed and is now available for public viewing. It focuses upon four key areas:

- How can the NDL provide relevant and in-demand materials and programs to the community?
- How can the NDL make the best use of its space?
- What can the NDL do to make its services more convenient and accessible throughout the City and Township of Northville?
- How can the NDL better inform residents of the vast array of offerings available to them?

PARTICIPATE IN 1,000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN TO ENSURE YOUR CHILD'S LITERACY AND ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Numerous studies have estimated that as many as one in five children have difficulties learning to read, and reading has been associated as an early indicator of academic success. Because public education does not typically begin until ages 5 – 6, parents, guardians and caregivers are the first education providers during the early critical years of infanthood to pre-K.

1,000 Books Before Kindergarten is a simple challenge encouraging you to read books to your child, with the goal of reading 1,000 books before your child begins kindergarten. This establishes strong early literacy skills that will improve as your child learns and grows. Not only does this challenge build vocabulary, and improve speech and reading comprehension, it is also a great way to strengthen family bonds.

If you read just 1 book a night with your child, you will have read about 365 books in a year. That is 730 books in two years and 1,095 books in three years. If you consider that most children start kindergarten at around five years of age, you have more time than you think!


