FROM THE DIRECTOR

I spent a few days this summer in the great city of Philadelphia and visited Independence Hall, where both the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution were adopted. While I was inside that historic building, I was overwhelmed with gratitude for the courage and brilliance shown by America's founding fathers in creating these documents that became the backbones of our new nation. More than two hundred years later, these texts are still both relevant and remarkable, and continue to serve as the guiding beacons of the principles of our great nation.

Among the many freedoms that are guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution is the right to read. We live in a country where the government cannot tell its citizens what it can and cannot read and no one individual or group can determine for another individual what is appropriate for them to read. Even in 2024 though, this right does not exist for millions of people who live in countries without democratically elected governments. In fact, when a totalitarian government comes to power, one of the very first things it usually does is to restrict the flow of information available to its citizenry. The freedom to read is a precious right and Americans of all vintages cherish it and work to protect it.

Throughout its history, there have been attempts to ban certain books in the United States. Some of these attempts have been successful in some parts

of the country at various times. Unfortunately, there are again efforts underway right now to ban books in America.

Each year, the American Library Association celebrates Banned Books Week, where it spotlights titles that have been the subject of book bans. It is truly a remarkable list and I encourage patrons to spend some time reviewing it. You will be surprised by what you find there.

I encourage you all to read a book during Banned Books week which this year is September 22nd - 28th. Read any book you want and while you are reading, reflect on the fact that no one stopped you from reading that book. You read that book because you wanted to do so, simple as that. No government, group or individual told you that you could not. That is an amazing right and something that we should all celebrate every day. Like the grand Liberty Bell in Philadelphia, may our freedom to read always ring!

WHY GET AN NDL CARD?

If you don't already have a Northville District Library card, September is Library Card Sign-Up Month and is the perfect time to visit, show your driver's license or photo ID, and sign-up for one! Not a resident? That's okay too, library cards are also available for people who own property, work or attend school in the City and Township of Northville.

So, why get a library card?

An NDL card enables you to borrow more than books. You can check out readalong books for children or CD audiobooks. Take advantage of our extensive digital resources and stream a movie through Kanopy or send ebooks to your Kindle through Overdrive/Libby. Check out a youth STEM kit or picture books in other languages. We have one of the best public library videogame collections in the metro area, and a growing Library of Things collection. You can check out a telescope, a fishing pole, a birding kit, a disc golf set, or a travel chess set. We even lend WiFi hotspots!

If you're involved in family history and genealogy research, we have beneficial research tools on our website that include: Ancestry Library Edition (only available to use within the library), books on local history and written about Northville, Yearbooks, an online database of Historical Detroit Free Press Newspapers, Fold3 online database of military records, photos, and personal documents of servicemen and women, Digital Sanborn Maps, and more.

We can also request items from other libraries through our shared TLN catalog and through the statewide Michigan eLibrary catalog, or MeLcat for short!

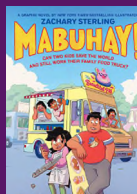

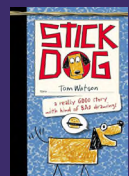

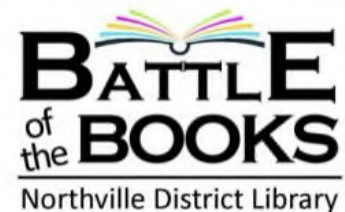

10 STEPS TO RUN YOUR OWN BOOK CLUB

1. Invite people to your book club (start small).
2. Decide if you want your focus to be on the book or if socializing will have a larger part of the meeting.
3. Determine how often your group will meet.
4. Select dates and locations.
5. Decide how you will select books: all at once or at each meeting. Is someone responsible for the book selection for each month? Will you only read fiction, nonfiction, or a mix of both?
6. Send reminders.
7. Pick up a book or several from your library or local bookstore.
8. Have discussion questions ready ahead of the meeting.
9. Make sure one person doesn't monopolize the whole discussion.
10. Have fun!

NDL has bookclub kits available to make your selection easier. The collection of bookclub kits is available through our catalog to browse and located on the lower level in the Adult Nonfiction area. Included in the kit are 8 copies of the book, the author's biography and several discussion questions.
