Background

Objectives

The primary goal of the survey is to collect representative community feedback to inform Northville District Library (NDL)'s decision-making as it evaluates options to improve its spaces.

Additional objectives of the survey are to:

- ◆ Characterize how residents use the Library
- ◆ Identify barriers preventing the use of public library services
- ◆ Determine the relative importance of different spaces and attributes for NDL in the future
- ◆ Assess satisfaction with the Library building
- ◆ Gauge levels of support for options to address space concerns
- ◆ Estimate the public's likelihood to vote for increased public funding to support the space options

Research Methodology

Working closely with NDL's leadership, Ivy Group consultants developed the questionnaire for the community survey. Upon the Library's approval, the team built the questionnaire within the Sogolytics survey platform and made it available via a link, a QR code, and in print. NDL promoted the survey on social and traditional media, within the Library, and through partnerships.

Participation

A total of 2,283 residents completed the survey, reflecting strong participation from both the City of Northville and Northville Township. This exceptional response represents 6% of Northville's population.

However, the City is overrepresented in the survey results. While the City accounts for 16.1% of Northville's population, City residents account for 37.8% of survey respondents (According to SEMCOG, the City is home to 6,069 residents, while the Township has a population of 31,557). This is worth noting, particularly given the anticipated growth in the Township.

Survey respondents were also older than the general population. Adults ages 40 to 64 make up the largest group, accounting for 41.9% of all survey respondents, while 34.0% of respondents are 65 or over. According to SEMCOG, the median age is 47.0 in the City and 45.2 in the Township.

Households of various compositions participated in the survey. 46.2% of respondents are in households without children, making up the largest share of respondents, and 12.8% are single person households. Family households are also represented, with 22.7% of households having young children and 19% having teens.

Overview

Northville loves its library.

The survey findings reflect a community that values its library and sees it as an important part of daily life, while also recognizing opportunities to strengthen and expand what the Library can offer in the future.

Overall satisfaction with the current building is high across demographic groups, suggesting that the Library is already succeeding in many of the areas residents care about most. Respondents expressed particularly strong appreciation for the Library's core services, including access to books and physical materials and library programming.

These findings reinforce that the library continues to serve as a trusted and heavily valued community resource.

While the public is happy with library services, there is room for improvement.

At the same time, the survey highlights several areas where residents see room for improvement. Concerns related to parking, access, study space, and meeting room availability appeared consistently throughout the responses, though the importance of these issues varied by location, age, and household type.

Township residents tend to focus more on convenience and accessibility, particularly parking, while City residents are more likely to express a desire for expanded collections, services, or spaces. Younger respondents and families with children are more likely to identify a need for additional study, gathering, and flexible-use spaces, suggesting evolving expectations around how the Library supports learning, work, and community connection.

The community favors expanding the existing NDL building — and is willing to fund it.

When asked to consider future space solutions, respondents show the strongest and most consistent support for expanding the current library building. Many residents appear to value both the existing location and the role the Library already plays in the community, while also recognizing that the current facility may need additional space and functionality to meet future needs.

A substantial share of respondents also express support for maintaining the current Library without major expansion, reinforcing the strong community attachment to the existing downtown location and the services already being provided. At the same time, feedback throughout the survey highlights interest in addressing space limitations, facility improvements, parking, and future needs, suggesting that many residents see value in thoughtful enhancements.

Support for branch or relocation concepts are notably more mixed than support for expanding the current building. Respondents express higher levels of neutrality and lower levels of strong support for these options.

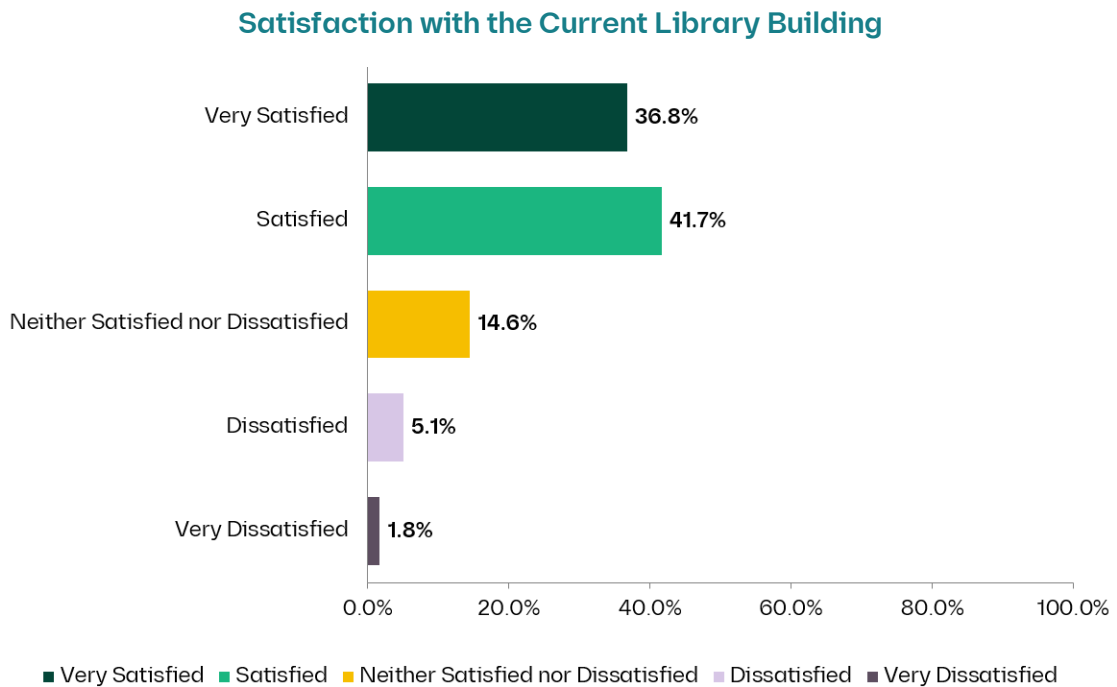
The findings also suggest that respondents are most willing to invest in solutions that build upon the Library's existing strengths. Expansion of the current building not only earns the broadest support overall, but also generates the highest willingness to financially support future investment.

Across the survey, residents consistently point toward a future that preserves the Library's core identity while thoughtfully improving its ability to serve a growing and changing community.

Insights

Satisfaction with the current building is strong.

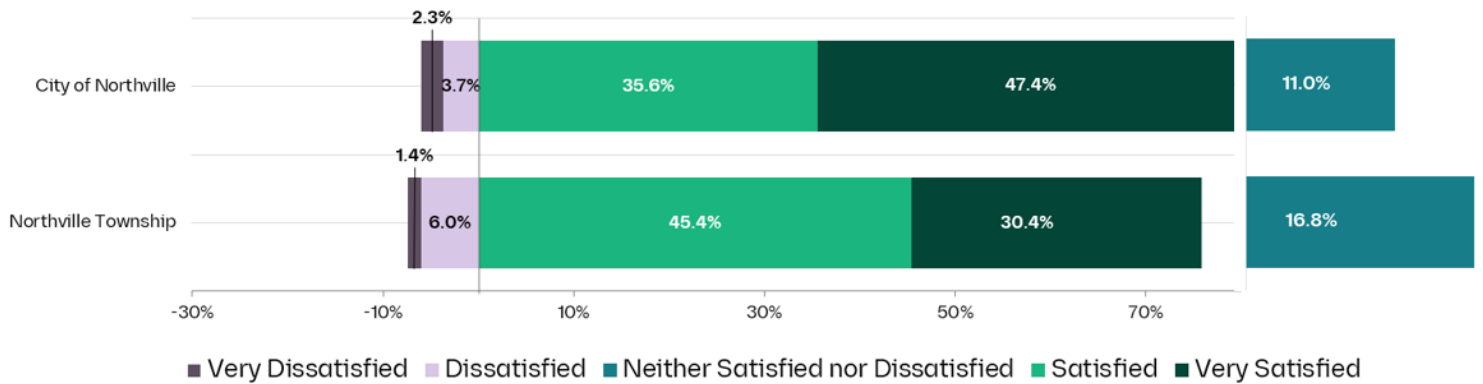
The majority of the community (78.5%) is satisfied or very satisfied with the current facility, with very few respondents expressing dissatisfaction (6.9%). A moderate share of respondents (14.6%) express a neutral opinion, which could indicate room to improve satisfaction by specifically addressing functionality, flexibility, and access.



Satisfaction with the Current Building by Location

Overall satisfaction with the current Library building is high across both the City and Township, with very low levels of dissatisfaction. However, City residents consistently express stronger satisfaction and are significantly more likely to report being “very satisfied,” suggesting a deeper level of attachment or connection to the current facility. In contrast, Township residents are more likely to respond neutrally or negatively than City residents, which may reflect less frequent use, weaker attachment to the current building, or greater uncertainty about whether the existing facility fully meets their needs.

Satisfaction with the Current Building by Age

Satisfaction with the current building is relatively consistent across age groups, though respondents ages 40 to 64 report slightly lower satisfaction and the highest overall dissatisfaction. Across all age groups, very few respondents reported being “very dissatisfied,” suggesting generally positive perceptions of the current facility regardless of the respondent’s age.

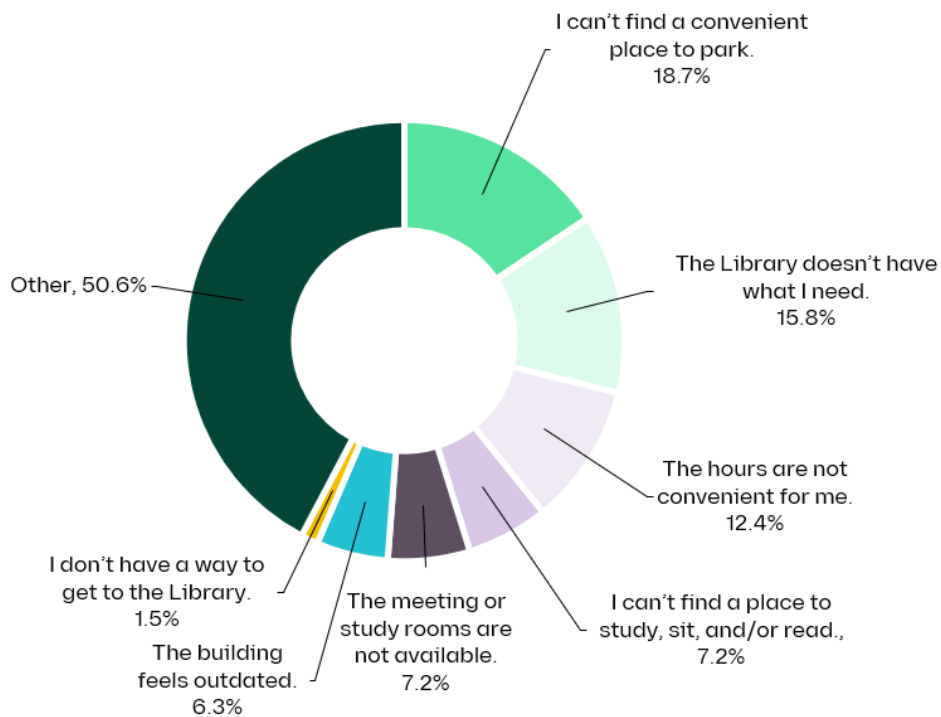
Satisfaction with the Current Building by Household Composition

Satisfaction with the current building is generally high across household types, though families with young children reported the highest dissatisfaction, suggesting that current spaces may not fully meet the needs of households with children. In contrast, households without children expressed the highest overall satisfaction.

Parking, unmet service needs, and limited access to study or gathering spaces emerged as the primary barriers to more frequent library use.

Excluding “other” responses, which accounted for 1,155 of the 2,283 total responses to this question, parking emerged as the most identified barrier preventing people from using the Library more often, with 18.7% of respondents selecting this option. Additional top barriers include respondents feeling that the Library does not have what they need (15.8%) and that the Library’s hours are not convenient (12.4%).

Barriers to Library Use by Location

There are clear differences in how residents experience the Library based on where they live. Township residents are significantly more likely to identify parking as a barrier, with 30.1% of Township residents selecting this option, highlighting the importance of access and convenience, while City residents are more likely to say the Library does not meet their needs (27.9%), suggesting different expectations around collections, spaces, or services. Other barriers are relatively consistent across both groups, and transportation is not a major concern.

Barriers to Library Use by Age

Barriers to Library use vary significantly by age group. Older adults are far more likely to identify parking and unmet needs as barriers, with 47% of people over the age of 65 selecting parking as a barrier, and 26.9% of people over the age of 65 selecting “The Library doesn’t have what I need” as a barrier, suggesting a stronger focus on accessibility and available resources. Younger respondents (children and 18-24 year old age groups) are more likely to report challenges with study spaces, the Library having what they need, and hours. Respondents under 25 also reported the highest need for transportation assistance, while very few respondents across any age group viewed the building itself as outdated.

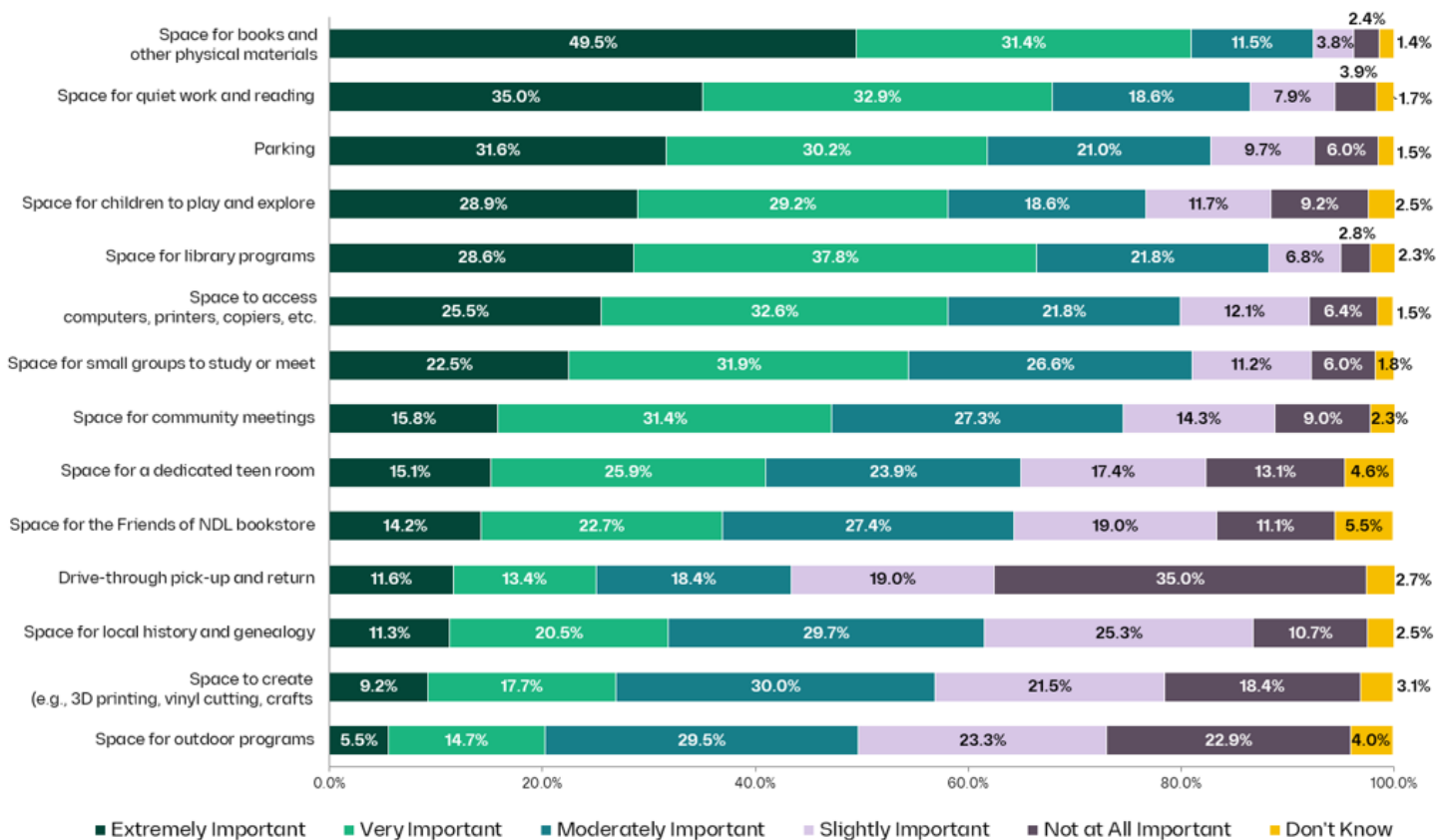
Barriers to Library Use by Household Composition

Barriers also differ by household composition. Single-person households and households without children are more likely to identify parking and unmet needs as barriers, while households with children are more likely to report challenges with hours and parking. Across all household types, relatively few respondents identified transportation as a barrier, and only a moderate share (ranging from 6-12%) felt the building itself was outdated.

Respondents place the greatest importance on the Library’s core functions and overall accessibility.

Respondents prioritize collections, quiet spaces, parking, space for children, and programming as the most important elements of the Library’s future. Top spaces and attributes that have the highest share of respondents rating “extremely important” for NDL in the future include “Space for books and other physical materials” (49.5%), “Space for quiet work and reading” (35.0%), and “Parking” (31.6%). “Drive-through pick-up and return” has the highest share of respondents rating “not at all important” (35.0%), followed by “Space for outdoor programs” (22.9%).

Importance of Library Spaces and Attributes in the Future



These results reinforce the community’s strong value for traditional library services and comfort in the building. It is also important to note that space for library programs is ranked at 66.4% when combining “very important” and “extremely important,” displaying a strong base of support for allocating space for programming. In contrast, amenities such as drive-through service and outdoor programming are viewed as lower priorities by a significant share of respondents. However, drive-through service may still represent an important long-term accessibility consideration, particularly for older adults, individuals

with mobility challenges, families with young children, and patrons navigating inclement weather.

Community feedback strongly favors expanding the existing Library building over relocating or developing a new facility elsewhere.

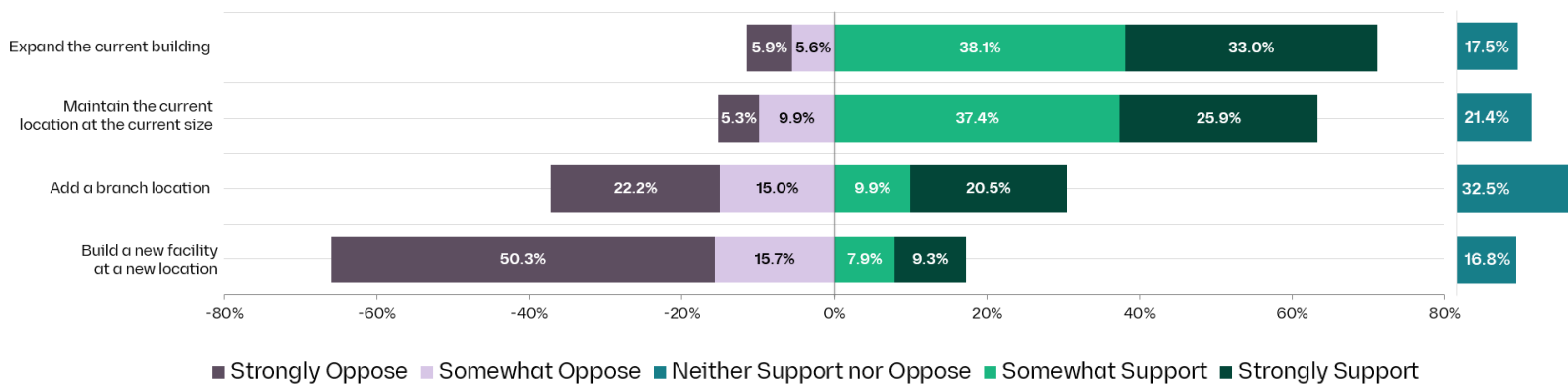
The public shows the strongest support for expanding the current building (71.1% somewhat support or support). Interest in adding a new branch (30.4% support) or relocating to a new facility (17.2% support) is notably lower.

Maintaining the current location also receives strong support, particularly among respondents with a stronger emotional attachment to the existing facility. In contrast, adding a branch location generates more uncertainty than enthusiasm, with supporters not indicating a strong opinion. Building a new facility at a new location faces substantial opposition, including a notably high share of respondents who strongly oppose the idea.

Expanding the current building emerges as the most preferred solution, including respondents who were dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with the current facility, those who highly prioritize parking, and those who view physical collections as extremely important.

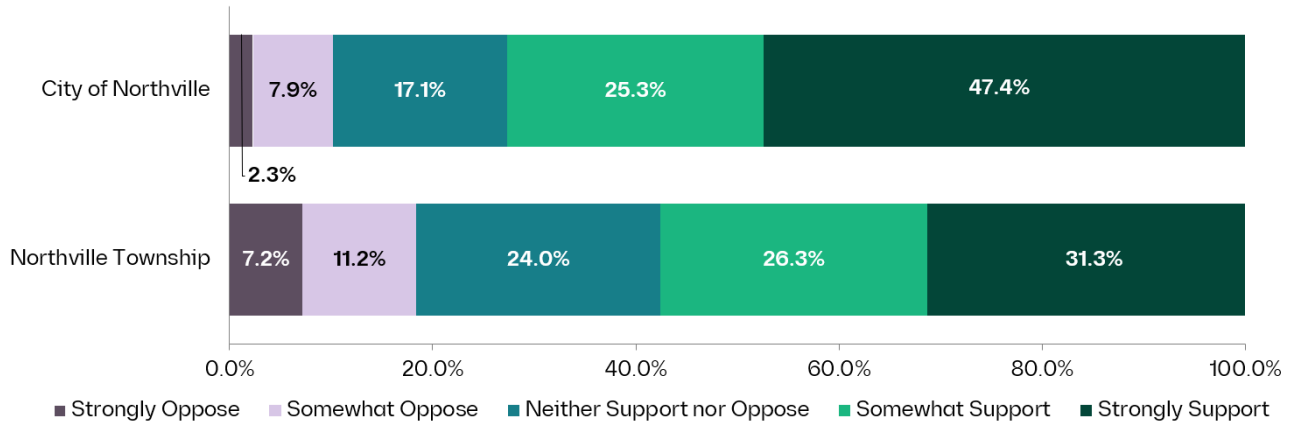
While support for adding a branch location is notably lower than support for expansion, the findings suggest there is still moderate openness to the concept, particularly in comparison to building an entirely new facility at a new location, which faces strong opposition across groups. Even non-users generally favor maintaining or expanding the existing Library over more significant relocation-based solutions.

Support for Options to Address NDL Space Concerns

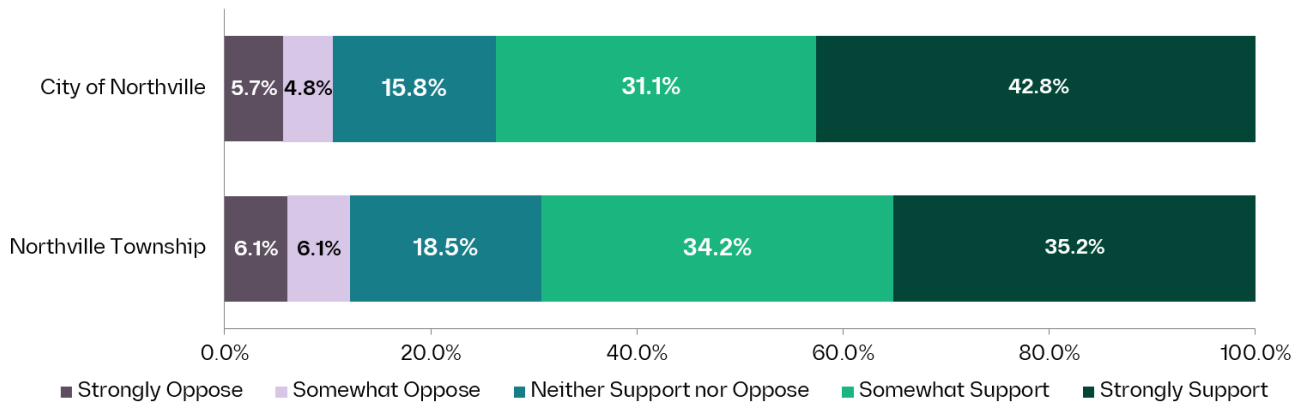


Community feedback favors expanding the existing Library, though responses differ between City and Township residents.

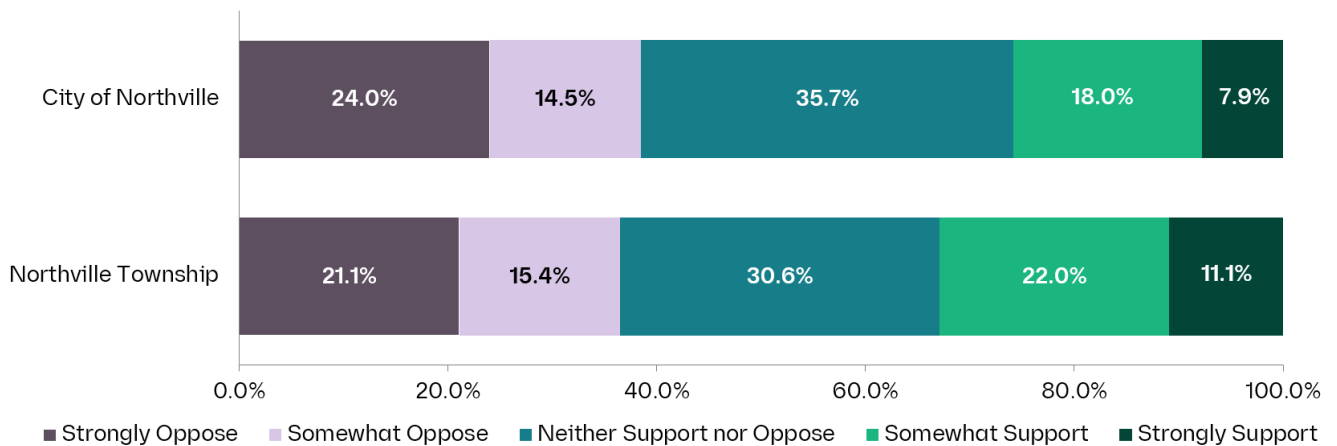
Distribution by Respondent Location: Maintain the Current Location at the Current Size



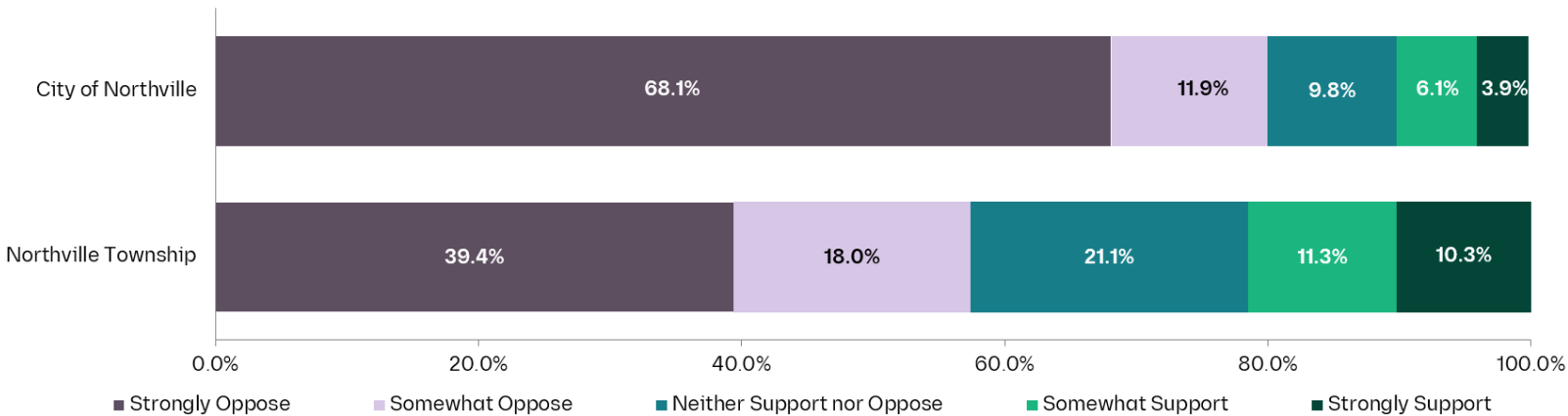
Distribution by Respondent Location: Expand the Current Building

Preference for Library Space Solutions by Location

Location plays a significant role in shaping preferences for future Library space solutions. City residents express much stronger support for maintaining the current location and show the strongest opposition to building a new facility elsewhere, suggesting a deeper attachment to the existing Library site. Township residents, while still broadly supportive of expanding the current building, consistently show higher levels of neutrality and somewhat greater openness to branch or relocation concepts, reinforcing the broader pattern that Township respondents may be approaching these decisions more from a practical and access-oriented perspective than from attachment to the current facility.

Preference for Library Space Solutions by Age

Support for expanding the current building is consistently strong across age groups, particularly among adults under 40, while building a new facility at a new location faces broad opposition across all ages. Older respondents express stronger attachment to maintaining the current location and are more likely to strongly oppose branch or relocation concepts, while younger respondents show greater openness or neutrality toward alternative models.

Notably, respondents under 40 show higher total support for a branch option (around 43%, compared to about 27% among those aged 40 and over), though fewer members of this age group completed this survey compared to those aged 40 and over, with a total participation percentage of 24.1%. Respondents under 18 consistently show the highest levels of neutrality, suggesting younger residents may feel less connected to current facility discussions or less certain about long-term space priorities.

Preference for Library Space Solutions by Household Composition

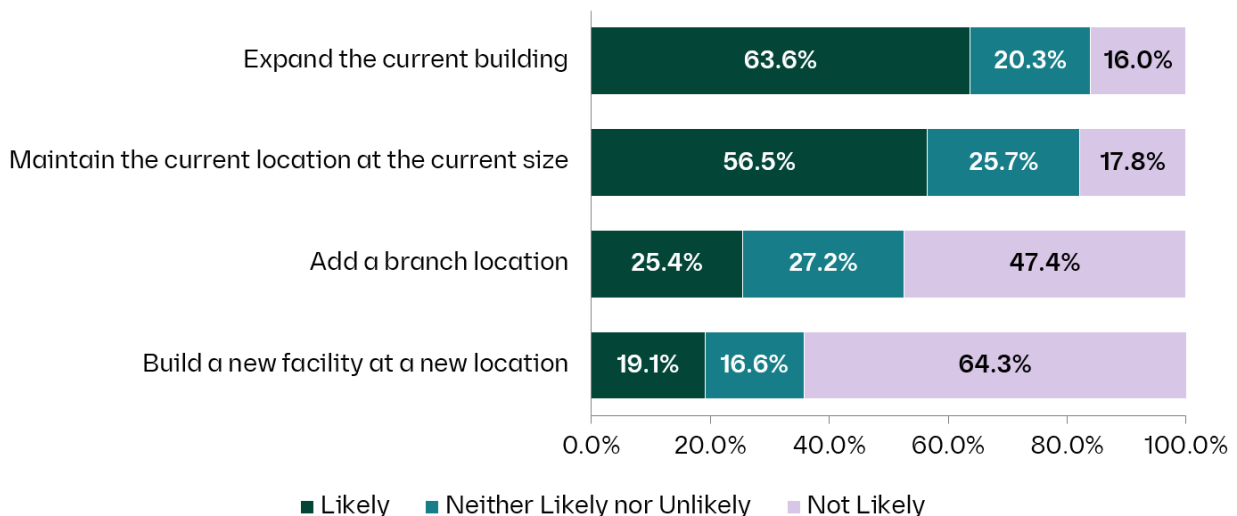
Across household types, respondents consistently show stronger support for maintaining or expanding the current Library than for adding a branch or building a new facility elsewhere. Families with children, particularly those with young children, generally show the highest levels of support for future library investment, suggesting a strong desire for enhanced library spaces and services. In contrast, households without children are more likely to oppose proposed space solutions overall, while single-person households show comparatively lower levels of support.

Respondents show the greatest willingness to financially support investments that enhance and build upon the existing Library facility.

Respondents show the greatest willingness to financially support expanding the current building, followed by maintaining the current location at its current size. Willingness to fund branch or relocation concepts is substantially lower, particularly for building a new facility at a new location, which faces the highest levels of resistance. These findings suggest respondents are most willing to invest in solutions that build upon and improve the existing Library rather than replace or relocate it.

Respondents generally indicate a willingness to financially support the space solutions they prefer, with expanding the current building demonstrating the strongest overall alignment between community support and willingness to fund. While there is moderate openness to a branch location among some respondents, support and willingness to pay for that option remains notably lower than for expansion. Overall, expansion emerges as the most broadly supported option.

Willingness to Financially Support Future Solutions by Location

Both City and Township residents show the greatest willingness to financially support expanding the current building or maintaining the current location, though support was consistently stronger among City residents overall. Township respondents are more likely to express neutrality across funding questions and show somewhat greater openness to branch or relocation concepts, though opposition still outweighs support for those options overall.

These patterns further suggest that City residents feel more strongly connected to the current Library, while Township residents may be evaluating future investments more through the lens of convenience, access, and long-term practicality. It is notable that Township residents are more likely to select a neutral option than the City, which could indicate less attachment and/or use of the current Library facility.

Willingness to Financially Support Future Solutions by Age

Across all ages, respondents show the strongest willingness to financially support expanding the current building or maintaining the current location, while branch and relocation concepts generate more hesitation and opposition. Adults ages 25 to 39 and households with children show the highest support for investment in the current Library, suggesting these groups may see the greatest long-term value in enhanced library spaces and services. In contrast, older adults and households without children are more likely to oppose branch or relocation, while younger respondents and single-person households express higher levels of neutrality, indicating less certainty or attachment to specific future space solutions.

Willingness to Financially Support Future Solutions by Household Composition

Across household types, respondents show the strongest willingness to financially support expanding the current building or maintaining the current location, while branch and relocation concepts generate greater hesitation and opposition. Households with children express the highest levels of financial support for investment in the current Library, while households without children are less likely to support increased funding for alternative space solutions.

Respondents took the opportunity to express support for keeping the Library downtown.

The most common theme identified in open-ended responses is strong support for keeping the Library downtown, with 10.5% of total responses referencing this preference, reflecting the community's clear appreciation for the Library's central location, accessibility, and longstanding presence within the heart of the community. This is followed by comments emphasizing the need for facility upgrades and modernization, with 6.7% of total responses referencing this preference, suggesting that many respondents value the current location but see opportunities to improve the building to better meet evolving community needs and expectations. Opposition to moving or expanding the Library also emerges as a notable theme, with 4.8% of respondents citing concerns, reinforcing the preference among many residents to preserve and invest in the existing facility rather than pursue more significant changes.

2.0% of respondents highlight the need for parking improvements, pointing to accessibility and convenience as ongoing considerations for library visitors. Meanwhile, limited but measurable support exists for adding a branch location, with 0.9% of respondents indicating support for this, and 0.4% of respondents supporting the construction of a new facility through their comments. Overall, the open-ended feedback demonstrates a strong sense of attachment to the current downtown Library, coupled with interest in thoughtful improvements that enhance the user experience and maintain the Library's established role within the community.
